Rector's Report for the Annual Meeting

As we begin my twelfth year as rector here at St. Michael's I am continually amazed at the dedication and faithfulness of you our parishioners! This year has been one of tremendous progress as we continue to work to fulfill our mission: "By being Disciples of Christ we invite others to be Disciples of Christ through daily prayer, weekly worship, regular Bible study, having a spiritual friend, giving to the church and outside the church." This past year we have continued our work, begun in 2017, on the renovation of St. Michael's. We began 2018 removing lots of the extraneous material from the church. At times it seemed like I would never finish going to the Salvation Army, Goodwill, the Recycling Center, and dumpster as we worked to use every bit of space we had and to beautify the church and make the space we had more usable. It took well into the summer of 2018 to finish the downstairs by installing all the baseboard that had to be discarded due to the flooding, put in new floor and paint Craine Hall, the rest rooms and our Sunday school rooms. This past year also saw us get purchase and install our new altar rail, receive a \$15,000.00 donation for risers for our choir and the installation of new cabinets, an island and sinks, including a pucina which drains directly into the ground. This is used so that the consecrated wine which is Christ's blood does not empty into the sewer but into the ground. We also painted the entire outside of St. Michaels this past summer. Ben Garrett, as his Eagle project, put in six raised gardens in the back of the church. Next year we hope to use the produce raised there to double the amount of food we gave this past year. Finally, we met in October to put back our flower garden in the back of the church. We met on a rainy day and still had eight people come out to help us get in the flowers, bushes and trees as we dug holes, watered, and the next weekend put down mulch.

This past year we have also added to our staff Fr. David Ottsen to work with our Youth group program for our Sunday School. He has introduced a new curriculum for our Youth Group called "Compass." It is based on the four focuses in the command to love God "with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Luke 10: 27). Fr. David also provided an excellent program on Opioid addiction that was led by the county coroner, our own John Chalfin. We are fortunate to have four excellent youth group assistant leaders in Vince Dingman, Mike Garrett, Pam Knowlton, and Karen Smith.

This year has been especially challenging for me, Alison, our children Nicholas and Sarah. Please keep us in your thoughts and prayers as Alison and I move forward with our divorce. We also had the departure of Jennifer Choisser this past February from our Sunday school program for our children.

This past year has also seen a number of deaths in our parish family. We have had three funerals since our last Annual Meeting. The following parishioners that have died: Kathleen Conner, Nancy Cutler and Sigrid Lundy. May their souls and all the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace.

I would be remiss if I did not thank our parting vestry members who have served so faithfully: Nancy Allen, Rita Ash, Ellen Lammers, Bob Salach, and Karen Smith. Nancy Allen has been the Stewardship Commission liaison for these past three years. She has worked hard to build up our commitment to our Lord through Stewardship here at St. Michael's! Rita has focused her attention on Outreach, especially Family Promise. It is exciting to see her commitment pay off as the program is set to open its doors in February. One of her outstanding achievements was to help raise \$6,322.00 at our last auction, this past year, of which \$3,161 went to family promise and the rest went to renovate the new sacristy. Ellen Lammers worked diligently in our office and focused much of her efforts on our web page. Bob Salach had the most challenging job overseeing all the work these past three years as Junior Warden on our building renovation. Hard to believe how much has transpired during his tenure. The entire downstairs has been painted, retiled and given new baseboards in part because of the three floods we experienced and the insurance settlement that allowed us to do this work. He has also overseen the renovation of the Sanctuary, the new kitchen upstairs, the new choir area, the new sacristy, and the wonderful bell tower, which chimes at least three times daily at 9am, noon and 6pm. He has also overseen the work on the garden in back, and saw us add the raised gardens and improvement of the gardens in front of the church. Obviously, he could not have done this by himself. The work of many, many dedicated parishioners is what made this possible. Some of whom come to mind are: Steve and Rita Ash, Steve and Penny Barnes, Gregg Cowell, Scott and Stacy Elmore, Ben Garrett, Kaleb Garrett, Mike Garrett, Al Geisler, Craig and Sharon Meyer, Jeff and Donna Padgett, Andrew Reynolds, Laurie Schoening, John Slendak, Rick Stilley, and Ron Wood. Karen Smith has been in charge of the worship commission, but her passion is and remains our children. She has helped oversee several Christmas pageants, more Vacation Bible School programs than I can count, led the children's singing downstairs and has worked with the Youth Group!

I would certainly be remiss if I did not thank Bailey Detamore and her commitment to our little ones these past two years! What a wonderful job she has done quietly making sure we have Sunday school every Sunday through her faithful giving of her time and talent! She has also helped these past two years with the Christmas pageant helping support those who worked on the pageant. Special thanks too, to Ashley Cloud who gave her all this past Christmas as the children once more did a beautiful job as they shared their talent and faith expressing the joy and miracle that Christmas is all about!

I also want to thank our office volunteers who have made sure our office runs so smoothly: Dick Cutler and Julie Gooden, who have come in whenever they were needed and helped us out by collating bulletins, sending out letters and post cards, and filling in wherever they were needed! We have also been so fortunate to have so many willing hands to help with our finances this past year: Tara Bennett, Matt Fischesser, Gail Geisler, Julie Gooden, Sheila McCormick, Rick Stilley and Ann Vollmar.

On a personal note, I must express my profound gratitude to all of you who have worked so hard for so long to help with the transition here to our home from Hinkle Creek School. We have been back just over a year. When Stacy Elmore told me the move would be very hard, I did not take her nearly seriously enough. I thought once we got back into our building everything would be downhill. I was very wrong. So much work has been accomplished since we moved back and all of you have been so patient. We have endeavored to work as fast as possible to get us moved in, with the hope the floor in the Sanctuary will be completed late this winter or in the early spring.

Finally, and perhaps most important, our vestry this past year has worked long and hard to continue to build on the momentum of past years! Please be sure to thank Bailey Detamore - Christian Education, Stacy Elmore - Senior Warden, Matt Fischesser – Treasurer, and Kelly Garrett – Family Life, for their many hours of hard work and faithfulness in making sure St. Michael's offered opportunities for all of us to grow into even better disciples of Christ! May God bless us this coming year as we continue to grow together in Christ's love and move forward as Disciples of Christ!

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT Fr. David Ottsen

[Please note: With one exception—Vacation Bible School—my report covers July 1 — December 31, 2018, which is the time frame in which I was employed by St. Michael's as Youth Spiritual Advisor and Pastoral Assistant.]

First and foremost, I want to thank our God, Fr. Lee and St. Michael's for the opportunity to serve in these ministries. I also want to thank the four Youth Leaders, who were already involved in youth ministry and continued to be involved after my arrival: Vince Dingman, Mike Garrett, Pam Lewis and Karen Smith. They all served well St. Michael's and the youth of the parish. I am grateful for all their work, support and dedication to the youth. [I need also inform the parish that Pam needed to make a change in her ministries and will not be continuing in 2019. She added much to our discussions and pastoral care and will be missed.]

As I volunteered for Vacation Bible School in June, I had a chance to begin to meet some of the youth were who volunteering themselves for VBS. Their energy, creativity, and participation helped make it a wonderful experience for the children.

I first officially met with the youth and their parents for a picnic gathering in July. This was simply a time to introduce myself and for all of us to meet. The gathering was well attended and we were successful in making our introductions.

In August, the youth took their annual trip to Holiday World. The Youth Leaders, along with some parents, made this happen and from all the reports following, all who attended had a good experience.

In September, we had a special unit on angels: All about Angels, Holy and Fallen. This occupied each Sunday of the month, including our very first time when we had to meet at the Fire Station next door due to St. Michael's being hit by lightning. (Thank you to our Firefighters who generously provided us the space.) The study ended on Sunday, Sept. 30, with the celebration of the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels and the youth taking leadership in all of our services.

In October, we began our study of The Living Compass (teen version). The study was undertaken from suggestions made by the youth in what they'd like to study. Given the rather chaotic nature of the final months of the year, we've been more hit or miss on this curriculum, but our intention is to continue to use it as our primary study throughout the spring.

In November, the youth sponsored and sought the involvement of the congregation for our outreach effort to fill and distribute Thanksgiving Baskets to those in need in Hamilton County. We were able to fill to overflowing our baskets for 9 recipients, giving them not just Thanksgiving Dinner but additional food and items for their household. Thank you to all who helped!

The Diocesan Youth Fall Retreat was held the first days of December and we did have youth and a youth leader who attended. Apparently, this time frame was different from the past and throughout the whole Diocese it was not as well attended as had previously been the case. Anyway, St. Michael's was represented!

In December, a special program on Opioids, presented by our own John Chalfin—Hamilton County Coroner—was held on the afternoon of the ninth. It was very well attended and we even had a neighborhood family and their two teenage sons attend as well. (They had seen our sign...Thank you, Jeff Padgett!) The next Sunday, the youth sponsored for the parish a Caroling Party for members who could not otherwise attend Christmas services. We had quite a number to visit, which took a little longer than planned, but everyone, carolers and those who listened to us make a joyful noise unto the Lord, enjoyed the outing. Finally, in December, several of the youth were able to take part in the Christmas

Pageant with the children for the 5 pm service on Christmas Eve. (Wow!.....what a December!)

We will continue to meet on Sundays from 10:20-11:15 and all youth are invited.

Last but not least, I want to thank my wife, Deborah, for the many times she has had to drop what she was doing so I could attend to youth ministry. Most of you probably know, but because of my visual impairment, I cannot drive when it is dark or beyond Noblesville, which means she has to drive me around. Thank you, Deborah!


Some of the things we do are:

Outreach Commission Report Recap

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The Outreach Committee, consisting of Laurie Schoening, Steve and Rita Ash, Nancy Allen, Charlotte Snyder, Larry Rider and Sara Wood, planned several projects over the year. The most recent project was our Christmas program where we collected food and gift items for two families, one of which came from Daysprings shelter. We also donated gift cards. Toys were also delivered to the Fire Station next door.

Throughout the year many parishioners helped cook and serve dinners at Daysprings shelter, with pizza and taco dinners being very popular. Thanks to the Cowells, Garrett family, Rita and Steve Ash, Sara and Ron Wood, The Lammers, and all others who helped serve. Our Daysprings families continually thank St. Michael's for wonderful meals. They can't get over how much food we serve at our dinners, especially Thanksgiving. Their appliances continually need repair and updates, if you ever wish to donate.

Steve and Rita Ash, Father Lee, Janine Cowell and Sara Wood continue to attend Family Promise shelter meetings over the year, assisting in the plans to help secure a Hamilton County Shelter for Family Promise. They are very close to opening the shelter, and funds for the board are in place. A van is needed and they will be publishing a wish list in the near future to help collect items for the shelter. If anyone has an employer looking for a philanthropic project to sponsor, please consider Family Promise a worthy venture. We will be asked to help host families four times during the year for a week, once the shelter is up and running. There are 13 churches signed up and additional churches are being approached. Kiss Kiss Bang Bang Salon in Carmel is hosting an auction and haircuts on Sunday, February 10, 2019, from 11:00 am – 3:00 pm to help raise funds for the shelter, if you wish to join us. See Rita or Laurie for this event.

We hope to hold several clothing drives during the year for Family Promise. Every bag donated by a church provides a family with a voucher to shop at Goodwill to purchase items for their families. One was held in 2018 and was very successful for the Indianapolis shelter.

In April, we held our annual auction. It was fun for everyone. Funds went to finish the Sacristy and to Family Promise. We hope to plan one again in April of 2019, so contact Outreach members if you are interested in helping or donating a gift item/basket. We are contacting vendors in Noblesville and Westfield to donate gift cards too. (Nice gift idea: a Lowes/Home Depot gift card and a basket to give to our Mothers for Mothers' Day!)

In June, we held our annual Strawberry Festival. Ed Jacques, Scott Elmore and Steve Ash were committee heads and we thank them for their time!! Our gross revenue for the 2018 year was \$21,106.26!! This was a record for the most funds we have raised at any Strawberry Festival thus far!! We joined forces again with Nickleplate Arts and they enjoyed sharing the day with us. Our event needs committee members now, to begin planning for 2019. Several vendors are asking if we plan to hold the event, so please sign up soon to help the committee during the year and the day of the event, however small.

Information on the two shelters that we sponsor:

Daysprings is an emergency shelter originally founded in 1987 by an Episcopal priest and we serve dinner there every other month. Daysprings served 150 families last year. They are located on N. Central Avenue, Indianapolis (www.dayspringindy.org – for more info).

We also sponsor Family Promise of Greater Indianapolis of the Interfaith Hospitality Network, which is a shelter located just north of downtown (1850 Arsenal, Indianapolis – www.familypromiseindyhn.org). Their requirement is that those taken in are a family unit. They are provided job training, interview skills, job hunting assistance and eventually they often move into an apartment with assistance from the shelter. Shelter employees continue to work with them for over a year to ensure they will be able to live on their own successfully. We feel strongly about both

organizations and will continue to sponsor them in 2019, especially with the Hamilton County shelter opening. The local Fire and Police Departments have confirmed the need is great here in our county, even though we are a fairly well-off community.

As always, please continue to shop at Kroger so that a portion of your grocery sale will come back to St. Michael's. The checks we receive from Kroger are roughly \$90-\$100 for our purchases, when we receive them. It is an easy online process to sign up for this program and a great way for us to earn money – that's enough to pay a utility bill during some months! See Laurie or Sara for directions on how to sign up on their website. You must sign up online for St. Michael's to get credit. Once you sign up, you can check the bottom of your Kroger receipt to see that a portion of the sale is donated back to St. Michael's. Thanks to Sara for getting us signed up under this program.

Rick Stilley has been establishing and continues to grow our Community Garden. I know he welcomes any assistance with the garden and flower beds. The Garrett family has been a big help with this over the past year. We will continue to donate fresh vegetables and fruit to our local community, the above two shelters, and our church family.

Anyone wanting to join our group is welcome and we always look for feedback for Outreach projects. We have sponsored Heifer International in the past, if anyone would like us to look into an International Outreach project. We did not participate in the annual Hamilton County Crop walk in 2018, but we are on the email list, if anyone has an interest. Any and all new ideas are welcome. We want to provide everyone with an outlet to assist those in our community. We will continue to collect monthly donations for Family Promise. Look for the boxes in the narthex to donate items. Biggest needs are diapers of ANY size, wipes, toilet paper, paper towel and cleaning supplies. New pillows too.

Thank you to everyone for their generosity and time and talents this past year!! We couldn't do it without all of your help!!!
























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
